## H<sub>1</sub>N<sub>1</sub> ADVICE FOR BUSINESS

H<sub>1</sub>N<sub>1</sub> influenza doesn't just threaten your health, it threatens our economy. Studies have shown that small & medium sized enterprises aren't as well prepared as they should be for the economic and business challenges that come with a pandemic. That is why the International Centre for Infectious Diseases and the Canadian Chamber of Commerce have partnered to help SME's plan to limit the economic impact of a flu pandemic. It is best to involve workers in a flexible strategy, which takes into account how severe the disease is in our community, how many of your staff is absent, and other factors such as school closures. ### Three Main Strategic Objectives:

#### 1. Reduce Transmission Among Staff

- Keep sick workers home and stay home until 24 hours after fever stops.
  - Expect sick workers to stay home for 3-5 days in most cases.
  - Develop non-punitive and flexible leave policy. Do not require a doctor's note as medical facilities are likely swamped with other priorities.
- Encourage good hygiene practice.
  - Place posters in workplace encouraging cough and sneeze etiquette.
  - Provide tissues and no touch disposable receptacles.
  - Encourage frequent hand washing.
  - Clean surfaces that may have frequent hand contact.
- Consider increasing spacing between employees or staggered shifts to enable less crowding.
- Encourage employees to get vaccinated.

#### 2. Protect Employees At High Risk

- Pregnant women and people with certain chronic conditions such as hypertension/diabetes may be at higher risk.
- Consider reassigning these workers to areas where they will be less exposed to other people.
- Keep track of those who have recovered from H<sub>1</sub>N<sub>1</sub> and are now presumably immune. They could serve as frontline staff now.

#### 3. Maintaining Business Operations

- Identify essential business functions and essential job roles. Determine critical elements within your supply chain (raw materials, supplies)
- Think about how your business would operate if 30% or 50% of your staff is sick and away or if a supplier cannot supply an essential component.
- Cross train staff in especially critical areas of your business function.
- Consider at what point you would have to partially or completely shut down the business.
- Consider how school closures might affect your employees. Parents may have to stay home to care for their kids. Plan a flexible leave program to enable this or encourage workers to think now about alternative childcare.
- Strongly recommend that parents not bring their children to work in such a situation.
- Can some work functions be done remotely from workers' homes (eg. over the internet)?

### Conclusion

As employers, you need to balance several objectives in trying to reduce the impact of H<sub>1</sub>N<sub>1</sub> on your business.

Whilst attempting to maintain your operations, you need to handle ill patients and their ill families with sensitivity.

Crucial to your success is to have a plan in place before any potential problems emerge.
